## **Essay Rubric**

- 1. Answer: To what extent does the essay answer the question?
- 2. **Structure and Organization**: To what extent is the essay structured and organized with a clear introduction, body, and conclusion?
- 3. <u>Argumentation</u>: How well does the essay use logic, evidence, and examples to support its argument?
- 4. <u>Use of Sources</u>: How effectively does the essay incorporate sources into its argument?
- 5. Counter-Arguments: How well does the essay identify counter-arguments?
- 6. **Response to Counter-Arguments**: To what extent does the essay respond to the counter-arguments?
- 7. **Originality**: To what extent does the essay demonstrate original thought and critical thinking, rather than merely summarizing existing perspectives?
- 8. Clarity: How clear is the essay's writing?
